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DON'T 'do service' ... never have. In several years of correspondence about AA matters I have never been able to write "Yours, in service". It sounds, well, so worthy.

Instead I try to practice the

12<sup>th</sup> step, which is a bringing together of all the eleven previous ones in my personal programme of recovery. I started down this particular path when I was about five months sober in AA.

The only work I could find (after years of being unemployable) was a long way from home, and I found it a very stressful experience.

I missed my sponsor and the friends I had made in my home group.

Fortunately there was a meeting every day in the centre of the city where I was working, and I was always there. It

kept me out of trouble and away from temptation. It was my daily fix.

One evening, I arrived late and took a vacant seat next to the door. After ten minutes, a telephone in the corridor outside began to ring, and everybody turned to look at me.

It was the local helpline, and the person sitting nearest the door was the one always delegated to

answer it. So I did.

I got a distressed caller who said he was in a phonebox outside a pub 20 miles away. Could we help?

If not he was going into the pub "to get slaughtered."

Panic stricken, I pulled a



couple of others out of the meeting and asked what I should do?

"Get his number, call him back and keep him talking until we get there in a car" was the immediate answer.

So began my first 12th step. I talked as if my life, not his, depended upon it, and I kept him on the other end till the two guys arrived to take him in hand.

Then I went back into the

meeting positively bathed in a warm glow and at least two feet taller. To this day I don't what eventually know happened to the guy in the phonebox, but something happened to me that evening. I began to discover how AA works.

I was still buzzing about this several months later when I finally found work back home, and recounted the story to a couple of folk over coffee after a meeting. "Ah", said one, "sounds like you're ready to start doing phone duty then. It'll do you good." So I sat in for a few nights with a couple of old hands in the incredibly scruffy telephone office we rented, after which I was told just to get on with it.

There was no stirring call to action, no invoking of traditions, concepts or any mention of the word service – just the simple words "*It'll do you good.*" And it has.

I've gone on to be involved with PI, schools talks, prison sponsorship and other things besides.

I once sponsored someone in prison who was sober twice as long as I was, and knew the programme a great deal better that I did - he had rather more time on his hands to read the literature!

He got sober in gaol, for a crime which he had no memory of committing,

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because it happened in a blackout. He taught me a lot. I last saw him at his

wedding, still sober, not long after he was released. He's one AA I feel really grateful to have known.

I have no beef with the word service, nor with anyone who uses it, and regard Bill's 12 Concepts for World Service as among the very best of AA's literature. I just do what I do because it keeps me sober and makes me feel good.

### **PI EVENT SUCCESS**

AN AA Public Information Meeting held in Teulada on 22 May 2009 was a great success. Among the professionals present were 6 doctors; a minister and others representing three different churches; a journalist; two health workers and a Samaritan volunteer.

The PI meeting opened up dialogue and interest with our non-alcoholic AA friends, some of whom send suffering alcoholics to AA meetings.

The response from professionals was fantastic and there was a general sense that they are keen for more information. **THE FOLLOWING** piece was taken from the King's Church website following one of their pastor's attendance at the AA PI Meeting on 22 May 2009 in Teulada.

RAISE FROM K

The King's Church was invited to attend a recent Public Information Open Meeting of the Costa Blanca Alcoholics Anonymous Group. There were representatives of several local AA groups which meet up and down the coast, as well as from their sister group Al-Anon, who offer support to relatives and families of suffering alcoholics.

Also in attendance was a local GP, who gave a very informative presentation about the physical symptoms and affects of alcoholism on both the mind and body of the sufferer.

During the meeting, we heard one man's testimony of how alcohol addiction had almost destroyed his life. He made references to the 'demons in his head' and the way that his whole personality was affected by his need to drink. There were many times when he ended up in prison for GBH and he began to despise himself for what he had become. Often, he said, he was terrified when he awoke from a drunken stupor not knowing what he might have done in the hours previously, but fearing that he was capable even of taking another human life while under the influence. He

started to become a recluse and locked himself away where he could drink himself into oblivion and not harm anybody.

Eventually, he became so depressed that he considered taking his own life. That was when he finally contacted Alcoholics Anonymous and found that there were people who understood him because they had shared some [all]\* of his experiences and yet had found through a network of mutual support they were overcoming the addiction and 'getting their lives back'.

'The 12 Steps of AA, is a recovery action plan. The steps make frequent references to a 'higher power' or 'God as you would define him' as the source of their strength in recovering from alcohol addiction.

Each person is allowed to decide for themselves who, or what this 'higher power' might be. I believe that the one true God as we know Him is both able to and indeed does use AA to help people to find release.

'I would not hesitate to recommend anyone who recognises a need to break free from an addiction to alcohol to use this organisation.'

### THERE IS NOTHING WHERE I USED TO BE

ANY YEARS AGO, I heard someone in a meeting say: 'My life had become the length and breadth of my back doorstep'.

Although my life had not *yet* become quite so limited, I immediately identified fully with those few words and that sentiment has stayed with me ever since.

For me, it was a powerful and visual message of where alcohol can take me. It conjured up in my mind the limitations, that drinking alcohol to excess, place on my life.

When I drink, I begin to lose things. Possessions and material things tend to go first. Relationships end, in which I have been careless, thoughtless and selfish.

Unseized opportunities and closing doors become common. Away fly my dignity, worth, morals and values.

Finally, out goes the light on my very self — the person I once thought I was blows away like scattered sand.

I become nothing and therefore when I

sit on my back doorstep that is all I can see and all I can be. Nothing but its length and breadth. Nothing but it. For my essence is no longer present.

Going to meetings and sobriety begin to hand me back very slowly, a grain at a time, my self.

And at times a new self emerges. And with it, I begin to build my worth, my inner strength, my lost personality, my confidence, my capabilities, and love and compassion for myself and others.

I am not a patient person — I was in a hurry to rebuild, grapple back what I felt I had lost as quickly as possible. I wanted it all now. But it doesn't work like that. It takes its time. And thank goodness!

Because essentially it is a very long journey, a slow and gentle rebuilding. It requires endless change for it is a massive shift and move from the length and breadth of the back doorstep to the limitless horizons of recovery.
